## **Georg Sverdrup Society Holds Fourth Annual Meeting**


The program for the fourth annual meeting of the Georg Sverdrup Society, commemorating the 100th anniversary of Georg Sverdrup's death, was held in Minneapolis on October 13, 2007, at the Association Free Lutheran Theological Seminary chapel. Prof. Sverdrup died May 7, 1907.

Hymns from his funeral service were sung, a translation of an article describing the service was read by Rev. Raynard Huglen, and a tribute was given by Rev. Ronald Dahle, grandson of Rev. Ole Dahle, a casketbearer.

Since the Georg Sverdrup Society is focusing on translating Sverdrup's writings on missions during 2007 and 2008, a translation of the address he gave at the inauguration of the Augsburg Mission Society in 1885 was dramatically pre-

Madagascar was the first mission field for Augsburg Seminary graduates. In attendance at the annual meeting were four former missionaries to Madagascar. L to R: Kathy and Dr. Stanley Quanbeck, Rev. Amos and Ovidie Dyrud, and Rev. Ron Dahle.

Dr. Quanbeck represents the third generation of a family of missionaries to Madagascar. His grandparents, Rev. J. B. Jerstad and his wife, began serving in Madagascar around 1898 and continued until Jerstad's death there in 1911. Stan's parents, Rev. Caleb and Connie Jerstad Quanbeck, began serving in 1928. Rev. Quanbeck served 56 years before his retirement. Dr. Quanbeck was raised in Madagascar and returned as a medical missionary with his wife, Kathy, a nurse. They served there 40 years.

Rev. Amos and Ovidie Dyrud were missionaries to Madagascar from 1950 to 1969. After returning to the United States, Rev. Dyrud served as Dean of the
